Transcript of Lock entries from the digital archive of *The Times* prior to 1985

The archive was searched under "People" for births, marriages, deaths and obituaries relating to descendants of William Lock of Dorchester (1780–1851) and their spouses. A comprehensive search has been undertaken of occurrences of the name "Lock", but it is clear that the optical character recognition system used was not perfect, so some entries will have been missed. Quite a few such entries have been added by examining the issues of *The Times* immediately after known dates. Selective searching has been undertaken for other surnames featuring in the family tree. Details of spouses are included only from the time of marriage, and a subsequent marriage of a spouse is noted only where the marriage to a Lock descendant ended on death rather than by divorce.

The Athenaeum announces the death of Mr. GEORGE LOCK, one of the original founders of the publishing house of Ward and Lock, which came into existence 37 years ago. He was a member of an old Dorsetshire family and was born at Dorchester in February, 1832. Educated at a private school at Southampton, Mr. Lock was articled to the late Mr. Squarey, an agricultural and general chemist at Salisbury, and served his time with him. In 1854 he came to London and was introduced by his cousin, Mr. Thomas Dixon Galpin (then in partnership with Mr. George Petter as Petter and Galpin), to Mr. E. Ward, who, after an experience of ten years in the house of Henry G. Bohn, had been for some years managing the book business of Ingram, Cooke, and Co., the "National Illustrated Library." The two entered into partnership as Ward and Lock in 1854 at 158, Fleet-street, premises occupied some years before by the late Mr. David Nutt. They built up a considerable connexion throughout the country, establishing a high

character for activity, enterprise, and sound judgment. There was from the first a recognition of the increased educational requirements of the age and of the growth of popular literature, and the success of the firm was based on the publication of good books at low prices. Mr. Lock and his partner subsequently entered into business relations with the late Mr. S. O. Beeton, whose publications they purchased and continued, thus becoming proprietors of "Beeton's Boy's Magazine" and annuals, the "Household Management" of Mrs. Beeton, and other works. After some years Mr. Charles Tyler, a brother of Mr. Alderman Tyler, joined the firm, which was then known as Ward, Lock and Tyler, and removed from Fleet-street to the premises in Amen-corner formerly occupied by Orr and Co. After the retirement of Mr. Charles Tyler, Mr. James Bowden and Mr. J. H. Lock, the brother of Mr. George Lock, both of whom had worked in the firm for many years, became partners, and the style was altered to Ward, Lock, and Co. The rapid increase of the business necessitated the erection of larger premises—Warwick-house, Salisbury-square—to which the firm removed in 1878. A branch house was also established in New York, and another subsequently at Melbourne. Advancing years and the necessity for rest some years since induced Mr. E. Ward to withdraw from any active share in the management of the house, and the enfeebled health of Mr. George Lock during the last two years naturally threw more of the work upon the other partners, Mr. James Bowden and Mr. John Lock. It was determined a short time ago that the future style of the firm should be Ward, Lock, Bowden, and Co. Mr. Lock leaves a widow and nine children. Of his five sons, three are engaged in the business he helped largely to create.

Mr. Lock took a special pride in the vitality of his older publications, among then the "Moxon" editions of the poets, the "Beeton" books, Haydn's Dictionaries, and the works of Victorian novelists such as Henry Kingsley and Whyte-Melville, whose books he reissued in collected editions, and but lately he was discussing new issues of the novels of Anthony Trollope and Charles Lever, many of which are still the copyright of the firm. Of several widely successful novelists of the younger generation Mr. Lock might almost be called the inventor, so adroit was he not only in discovering what the public wanted, but in inspiring successful novelists to explore new territory. Of literature, ancient and modern, his knowledge was aided by remarkable powers of memory. He was a shrewd man of business and, notwithstanding his busy life, a keen sportsman. His topographical knowledge of the British Isles was remarkable. He will be greatly missed by many friends, and not least by his large staff of employés, to whom his name will stand for all that is kindly and considerate. He leaves a widow, two sons, and a daughter.

Educated at Charterhouse (where he was a member of the winning eight at Bisley) and Caius, he took a first class in the Natural Science Tripos, and was Frank Smart student in 1902, becoming a Fellow of his college two years later. After working at the Royal Botanic Gardens at Peradeniya, Ceylon, he acted as Curator of the Cambridge University Herbarium for three years; then he returned to Ceylon as Assistant Director of the Botanic Gardens, and was Acting Director in 1912. He received his appointment under the Board of Agriculture in the following year.

Mr. Lock was the author of several publications on subjects connected with botany and genetics, and his "Recent Progress in the Study of Variation, Heredity, and Evolution" reached a third edition in 1911. He married, in 1910, Miss Bella Sidney Woolf, daughter of the late Mr. Sidney Woolf, Q.C.

His last letter before the siege of Kut showed him occupied with his light-draught boat in taking soundings for the rest, and in this way getting nearer to Baghdad than any other boat, The siege of Kut put an end to his services on the river, and he was shortly afterwards given a commission in the Reserve of Officers and attached to the Indian Infantry. He served during the whole of the siege and was slightly wounded in March, but recovered, and at the surrender was well enough to endure the two months' march through Asia Minor to Kastamuni, where he was interned. He had written cheerfully of his condition and good treatment by the Turks up to July 20, and his death was quite unexpected. The information is unofficial, but only too trustworthy. He was to have been married last autumn to Miss Dorothy Robson, of Sutton, near Hull, but the wedding was postponed to enable him to serve his country. His surviving brother is Engineer Lieutenant-Commander Lock, R.N.

JUDGE FOSSETT LOCK. His Honour Judge Benjamin Fossett Lock, who died yesterday, at Bridlington, in his seventy-fifth year, was a link with the old Positivist Society, of which he was honorary secretary from 1880 to 1886

The son of Henry Lock, solicitor, of Dorchester, he was a younger brother of the Rev. Walter Lock, Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity at Oxford, and formerly Warden of Keble, and was born on December 13, 1847. He went to Dorchester Grammar School, and was elected a King's scholar at Eton, and in due course a scholar of King's, Cambridge, where he took his degree in 1871. He was called to the Bar by Lincoln's Inn in 1873, and joined the Chancery Bar, the Western Circuit, and the Dorset Sessions. He also practised as an equity draftsman and conveyancer. In 1913 he was appointed County Court Judge of Circuit 16 (East Riding and parts of North and West Ridings of Yorkshire).

Judge Lock was a man of varied interests. He was the author of the article on Professor Maitland in the "Dictionary of National Biography," and he collaborated in two issues of "The Annual Practice," 1910–11. In the work of the Selden Society he took a great interest, and was honorary secretary for eighteen years and a member of the Council till his death. He had held a commission in the Royal Naval Artillery Volunteers, and was a member of the Admiralty Volunteer Committee. For twenty-six years he was chairman of committee of the Social and Political Education League, and was till his death chairman of the Central Legal Aid Society, vicepresident of the Dorset Men in London, and member of the council of the Yorkshire Archaeological Society. He wrote various articles and pamphlets on the defence of poor prisoners and legal aid for the poor. Mrs. Lock, who was the daughter of the Rev. J. P. Hammond, died in 1920, leaving a son and a daughter.

DR. WALTER LOCK LONG SERVICE TO KEBLE COLLEGE

Dr. Walter Lock, whose death we announce on another page, was for nearly 60 years a notable figure at Oxford. Keble College owes to him, as tutor, Sub-Warden, and Warden, a great debt; he held in succession two important Divinity professorships; he adorned the Oxford School of Theology by his learning and by his published works; and he took his full share of the administrative business of the University.

But there can be no doubt that the first place in his affections was held by his college. The ideals which he held up, both for himself and all other members of it, were again and again expressed in the illuminating sermons and quiet addresses which he gave within the walls of its noble chapel. No institution or aspect of the college life was without a real interest for him, and it must have surprised many a youthful Keble man to find that the eminent scholar and professor to whom he looked up was little, if at all, less keen than himself that the Keble boat should be high on the river, or that the concert in Eights Week should be a success. To some, no doubt, Dr. Lock's official attitude, donnish, and in early days even schoolmasterly, as it often was, proved something of a barrier, but not a few discovered, especially in moments of trouble, that behind this there lay ready for them a rich store of fatherly sympathy and encouragement, sometimes, too, in cases of need, of generous material aid.

Walter Lock was born on July 14, 1846, the second son of Mr. H. Lock, solicitor, of Dorchester, Dorset. He was educated at Marlborough College under Dr. Bradley, who in a short time sent out so many classical scholars to win distinction at both Oxford and Cambridge. Of these Dr. Lock was one. Going up as a scholar of Corpus Christi College in 1865, he won the Hertford scholarship in 1867, and the Craven in 1870, taking also first classes in Classical Moderations in 1867 and *Lit. Hum.* in 1869. In 1869 he was elected Fellow of Magdalen College, and held his Fellowship until his marriage in 1892. He also gave promise of his

subsequent skill as a speaker and preacher, at the Union, of which he became Librarian in 1870 and President in 1871. One of the last but not the least indebted or grateful of the pupils of Professor Conington, he imbibed from him a knowledge and a love not only of classical but also of English poetry and prose. In 1869–70 he acted as assistant to William Young Sellar, Professor of Humanity at St. Andrews, and then returned to be one of the first tutors at the recently established "New Foundation of Keble College," under the Wardenship of the Rev. E. S. Talbot, later Bishop of Rochester, of Southwark, and finally of Winchester. Dr. Lock held his tutorship for more than a quarter of a century, was Sub-Warden from 1882 to 1897, and was elected Warden in 1897, continuing in the service of the College until 1920, 50 years in all.

Ordained deacon in 1872 and priest the next year, by Bishop Mackarness, of Oxford, he was Examining Chaplain to the Bishop of Lichfield (Dr. Maclagan) from 1881 to 1891, and continued to serve him when he became Archbishop of York, till 1908. A real student and of assiduous industry, Dr. Lock contributed much, mainly to sacred and ecclesiastical literature. In 1895 he had been appointed Dean of Ireland's Professor of the Exegesis of Holy Scripture. His first publication was his "Keble College Sermons," in 1877 and 1889. In 1892 he wrote an excellent and artistic Life of John Keble, which contains a sympathetic sketch of the Oxford Movement, following it up with the "Annotated Edition of the Christian Year," which again was followed by a similar edition of the "Lyra Innocentium" in 1899. He also published papers on the Bible and the Old Testament in the "Oxford House Papers," "St. Paul the Master Builder" in 1899, articles in Hastings's "Dictionary of the Bible" in 1901, and the "Bible and Christian Life" in 1905. Side by side with all this, he served faithfully not only his college but the University, being for a number of years a member of the Hebdomadal Council and chairman of the Board of Faculty of Theology, Proctor in 1882-83, and examiner in theology both at Oxford and at Cambridge. He was also select preacher at Oxford in 1889-90, and later at Cambridge. He interested himself much in the cause of women's education, and was for a number of years chairman of the governing body of St. Hugh's Hall. He was a governor of his old school, Marlborough, and of St. David's College,

In 1919, though now 73 years of age, he was elected with general approval to the oldest chair in the University, Lady Margaret's Professorship of Divinity, keeping up the long series of holders who had been Corpus men, and being pressed to retain the position into and beyond his eightieth year. This he consented to do, resigning in 1927. He was elected honorary Fellow of Magdalen in 1897, of Corpus in 1920, and honorary member of the Keble Council in 1922, and had been already honorary Canon of Christ Church for some seven years before he became an actual Canon as Margaret Professor.

As a theologian, Dr. Lock was distinguished by an allround knowledge of exegetical scholarship, to the study of which he devoted many years of patient labour. At the same time he always kept in mind the ultimate purpose of all theological science. Thus he said of the valuable "Westminster Commentaries on the Revised Version," of which he was the general editor:—

They aim at combining a hearty acceptance of critical

principles with loyalty to the Catholic faith. Our desire is that they should be useful, not merely to the theological student, but to the growing number of educated laymen and laywomen who wish to read the Bible intelligently and reverently.

This spirit was particularly apparent in the late Dr. Driver's admirable commentary on Genesis in this series. As the author acknowledged, it owed much to Dr. Lock, whose suggestions he often adopted, and to whose judgement he always deferred. So, too, Dr. Lock's contribution to "Lux Mundi" on "The Church" was a striking contrast to certain other papers in that once famous book, by reason of its clearness, simplicity, and freedom from subtle argument and contentious reasoning. The most important of Dr. Lock's published works was "A Critical and Exegetical Commentary on the Pastoral Epistles," which, first undertaken nearly 30 years before, appeared in 1924. The author's ripe scholarship and balanced judgment were apparent in his handling of the problem of the authenticity of the Pauline Epistles. In this perhaps he carries caution to excess but he regarded the question of authorship as by this time one of secondary importance, since the value of the Epistles is amply attested by their influence in the history of the Church. They are inspired, he felt, by the true Pauline spirit, and the special excellence of the book lay, not so much in its carefully atomistic annotations of single words and phrases, as in the broad exposition of the analyses and paraphrases in which he strove to present an elevated Christian ethic.

How, with all this faithful work and his distinguished academical attainment, he escaped high ecclesiastical preferment it is not easy to understand. As a Churchman, he would have recommended himself, it might have been thought, almost equally to Mr. Gladstone or Lord Salisbury. In politics he was a strong Liberal, and supported the party, not only in 1906, but at times when many other Oxford Liberals hung back or fell away. He was always a man of peace, and greatly concerned for the preservation of happy international relations. Immediately after the War he took a leading part in raising funds in Oxford for the assistance of distressed University Professors in Austria and Germany: he was a strong supporter of the League of Nations Union, and served for many years on the committee of the local branch; very often in sermons in the Cathedral and elsewhere he advocated its principles. To him such work, done in a quiet and unobtrusive way, was a natural expression of practical Christianity. He advocated keenly the opening of the theological degrees to laymen, at the cost of some unpopularity with his natural allies. He was perhaps a little too academic to satisfy any party; more critical than creative; more the professorial than the practical divine, though he was businesslike, effective, and willing when there was any call for his services. But whatever else he was, he was sincere even to scrupulosity, modest as to his own attainments, a true friend, charitable, open-handed, and affectionate.

He married, in 1892, Miss Jane Campion, of Westmaston, Sussex, the sister of an old colleague at Keble, and left with four daughters a son, Mr. Heathcote Lock, who, like himself, became a scholar of Corpus, took a first class in Classical Moderations, and showed marked aptitude for high scholarship, but in the end preferred affairs and is in a business house in China.

A correspondent writes:—

The tragic death of Walter Heathcote Lock in the aeroplane crash at Gibraltar is not only a sorrow to his many friends but a grievous loss of character and ability. These had led to his occupying at a remarkably early age the responsible position of manager of one of the oldest and best known firms in China. War brought new opportunities. After serving as joint representative in Hong-kong of the Minister of War Transport, Lock was selected in October, 1941, for the onerous and most responsible post of the representative of the same Minister in the Persian Gulf. It is not possible at this time to describe in detail the nature of his achievement. What, however, can be said is that he succeeded by his quiet strength, unruffled confidence, expert knowledge, and attractive personality in welding into a real team the representatives of the various services and authorities

who worked under his chairmanship on the Basra War Transport Committee. The difficulties and responsibilities were both great. The achievement was such as to give great promise for the future contribution to his country's service he had it in him to make. He was looking forward to the new work as the Minister's representative in Canada to which he had just been called, and to the happiness of rejoining his wife there. Such men as Lock can ill be spared in war and still less in facing the post-war problems of the British Commonwealth, in which he seemed destined to play a distinguished part.

SIR ERNEST WILLS

LANDOWNER AND SPORTSMAN

Sir Ernest Wills, Bt., died yesterday at his home, Littlecote, near Hungerford, Berkshire, after a short illness. He was 88.

Ernest Salter Wills, the second son of Sir Edward Payton Wills, first baronet, was born on November 30, 1869, and educated at Monkton Combe and privately. He succeeded to the baronetcy on the death of his brother Sir Edward Chaning Wills, second baronet, in 1921. A Justice of the Peace for Somerset and Wiltshire, he was H.M. Lieutenant for Wiltshire from 1930 to 1942.

As a young man he was one of the last directors of the family tobacco business of W. D. and H. O. Wills which was founded by his great grandfather, Henry Overton Wills, in 1786. He entered the service of the company in 1892 and became a director in 1895. The board was dissolved and the company lost its separate identity six years later in 1901 when it joined with other leading British tobacco manufacturers to form the Imperial Tobacco Company to resist the competition of powerful tobacco firms in the United States which were then attempting to capture the British market. Wills joined the board of the Imperial Tobacco Company in 1922 and was a director until he retired in February, 1950.

A keen sportsman, he retained until the end of his life an active interest in his estates in Berkshire and Scotland which he bought shortly after the 1914–18 War. He had 8,000 acres at Littlecote, and also owned Meggernie Castle, Glenlyon, Perthshire.

He was an expert fisherman and shot and went north regularly each year to fish for salmon in the river Lyon which runs through the Meggernie Castle estate. In his eighty-seventh year he played and landed a 32lb salmon without the aid of a ghillie.

In the 1920s he bred and trained his own racehorses on his Berkshire estate, and while he was living in Wiltshire at Ramsbury Manor, his home for 10 years before he moved to Littlecote, he hunted with the Craven and Tedworth Hounds. In his younger days he was a lawn tennis player of tournament class and before the war was a familiar figure on the courts at Mentone, where he owned a villa, and at other places in the south of France. He continued to play until late into his seventies, but he did not revisit France after 1939.

He married in 1894 Caroline Fanny, daughter of W. A. de Winton, by whom he had two sons and three daughters. Lady Wills died in 1953.

The family honours now devolve upon Lieutenant-Colonel Edward de Winton Wills.

Lady Southorn, whose death was reported in *The Times*, was a woman whose small and plain-looking outside enclosed a spirit of extraordinary vitality and charm. Before she was married she had been a popular contributor to the children's magazine *Little Folks* and author of a series of pleasant books for children. This led

to her becoming the indefatigable pen-friend of innumerable child readers, with whose help she founded the "Little Folks" Convalescent Home, near Bexhill.

L. F. writes:-

The death of Lady Southorn was deeply regretted by those of us who had shared and enjoyed the privilege of her friendship in the Far East and later at home in England after her retirement.

Though her husband, the late Sir Thomas Southorn, occupied a senior position in Hongkong as Colonial Secretary, she did not stand aloof, as it were, but took part wholeheartedly in the social life of the colony. Though heavy demands were made on her because of her status she fulfilled these duties most willingly and brought to them that cheerful note which characterized all her social activities. Even in her last illness it was not a mournful note that prevailed when we visited her in hospital. On the contrary, we found her mind was clear and her memory of interesting experiences and of distinguished men and women who had made their mark in the world, was always vivid; and we felt that instead of consoling her in her sickness we were being entertained by her as she spoke of life in Hongkong, Ceylon, and the Gambia, where she had lived.

Naturally from such a rich store of knowledge and with her capacity for expression, it was not surprising to learn that she had published more than 20 books. The title of her first book was *Jerry and Joe, A Tale of Two Jubilees*—that of Queen Victoria's reign and the jubilation of the boy hero Jerry who attended the celebrations. She was, with E. Nesbit, a contributor to an omnibus book of children's stories entitled *Tales that are True for Brown Eyes and Blue*. In addition to these publications Lady Southorn was for 10 years a contributor to *Little Folks*. Known as Bella Sidney Woolf, she was a pioneer woman journalist.

Apart from her literary activities, Lady Southorn developed the Girl Guide movement in Hongkong and as commissioner brought to it a high degree of efficiency in a spirit of the greatest goodwill and co-operation among all races. When her husband became Governor of the Gambia she organized and supervised the movement there. Her family motto was "Thoroughly", and she lived in accordance with it.

Dr Martin Joseph Greenberg, FRCP, Consultant Chest Physician to Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge, and the East Anglian Regional Hospital Board, died suddenly while skiing in Switzerland on January 20.

Born in 1914, he was educated at King Edward VII School, Johannesburg, Witwatersrand University, Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, and St Bartholomew's Hospital. After qualifying in 1939 he served in the RAF Medical Service from 1940 to 1945 and attained the rank of squadron leader. He specialized in chest medicine after the War and was appointed Consultant Physician at the Manchester Chest Clinic and

associated hospitals in 1951 until he moved to Cambridge in 1956. Here he joined the consultant staffs at Addenbrooke's Hospital and Papworth Hospital and directed the Cambridge Chest Clinic which recently became incorporated in the new site of Addenbrooke's Hospital. The Rev Professor John Burnaby, who died on March 6 at the age of 86, had been a Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge, since 1915 and was Regius Professor of Divinity from 1952 until his retirement in 1958.

He was a theologian of distinction, an Augustinian not only in the sense that he was an authority of the first rank upon the writings of the great African doctor of the Church but also in the extent of his personal indebtedness to him. Originally a classical scholar, then a college administrator, he became a theologian comparatively late in life.

Burnaby was born on July 28, 1891, the second son of the Rev J. C. W. Burnaby. (His elder brother, Hugh, who became Dean of Emmanuel College and was also a theologian of note, died in 1956. His younger brother, Geoffrey, died of wounds in 1916.) From Haileybury he went up to Trinity in 1910 where he gained first class honours in both parts of the Classical Tripos, with the Chancellor's Classical Medal, and also held a Craven Scholarship. The First World War interrupted his course. He was elected a Fellow of Trinity in 1915 while serving in Gallipoli. When he returned to Cambridge in 1919 he became Junior Dean. At that time the College was overstaffed with classical scholars, and it was necessary for him to turn to college administration. In 1921 he became Praelector, Junior Bursar, and Steward. The lastnamed post entailed looking after the kitchens which he did not much enjoy, though he continued until 1930. In the following year he was also able to relinquish the Junior Bursarship. Although notably efficient, he was probably less happy with buildings and staffing problems than with undergraduates, and it was a welcome change to him when in 1931 he became a Tutor and in 1938, for seven anxious years, Senior Tutor.

Meanwhile his latest theological interests were developing. In 1938 he delivered the Hulsean Lectures, subsequently published under the title Amor Dei: a study in the Religion of Saint Augustine. Although the paucity of the attendance at the lectures was discouraging, it is unlikely that amore distinguished course of lectures has ever been given on John Hulse's foundation, and the publication of the book immediately disclosed the author to be a brilliant interpreter and critic of the mind of Augustine and a meticulous scholar of the first rank. The book also marked a change of direction in his life. In 1939 he became College lecturer in theology on the resignation of F. R. Tennant. He was ordained in 1941, and in 1943 succeeded H. F. Stewart as Dean of Chapel. At the end of the war he was appointed University Lecturer in Divinity, specialising in the early history of Christian doctrine and in 1952 followed A. M. Ramsey, later Archbishop of Canterbury and now Lord Ramsey of Canterbury, as Regius Professor of Divinity.

No election could have been more congenial to his colleagues, ad his leadership of the Faculty of Divinity won confidence on all sides.

Besides his fine monograph on Augustine he also published learned articles in the Journal of Theological Studies and elsewhere, smaller and more popular books such as Is the Bible inspired? (1949), Christian Words and Christian Meanings (1955), The Belief of Christendom, and a commentary on the Nicene Creed (1959). He contributed an important essay on the theology of prayer to the controversial volume Soundings (1962) and produced an excellent translation of some Later Works of Saint Augustine (1955). He was one of the few English theologians possessing a working knowledge of Russian. His style in lecturing was lucid and precise; and all his theological writing is marked by clarity, deep insight, and a conviction that the "simple" things of life are the most complex. He was also a very good preacher in a college chapel.

Burnaby was a man of many parts. His administrative experience made him invaluable not only to his college council, but to many university bodies such as the General Board, the Faculty Board of Divinity, and the Board of the Ordinary BA Degree over which he long presided as Deputy for the Vice-Chancellor. He had a wide knowledge of music, and was chairman for 15 years of the Faculty Board of Music, during the period when the tripos was invented.

He was essentially a college man, and lived a very full life in Trinity. He was also an accomplished actor (an ability shared by other members of his family), and for many years collaborated with Sir John Sheppard in the production of the Greek play. Almost every year he organized some short play or operetta for the Trinity May Week concert, and more often than not acted in it himself with distinction. His many other accomplishments included singing, folk-dancing, rock-climbing and reading Russian.

His pungent humour was terse and penetrating, and this, combined with his outwardly melancholy expression, to give him something of a Grock-like quality. To those who did not know him well a certain shyness made him seem sombre and forbidding, and this diffidence tended to lessen the influence he might have exercised as a tutor and theological teacher. To work on easy going terms with other people was not always easy for him; and his characteristically abrupt, jerky sentences could make him appear austerely remote and sometimes, if he felt deeply about a point, even alarming. This reserve may well have kept him in ignorance of the very deep respect and affection which his friends and colleagues felt towards him and of the value which they set on his grace, wisdom and understanding.

In 1922 he married Mrs Dorothy Helen Newton, widow of Captain W. Newton and daughter of the Rev J. B. Lock. They had two sons (of whom one survives) and a daughter. His wife died in 1971.
