 give and bequeath unto Robert Pugh and John Pugh of Bridgwater in the
 County of Saiop the sum of ten pounds each and I give and
 bequeath unto my servant Mary Aust the legacy or sum of ten pounds
 The foregoing legacies or sums of money I direct to be paid within twelve
 calendar months next after my decease I give and bequeath all my
 linen and clothing unto the said Mary Pountney and Maria White in
 equal parts to be divided between them I give and bequeath unto my wife
 the said Mary Pountney my gold watch and all my household goods &
 furniture plate china and knivets whosoever and wheresoever for her
 own use and benefit also unto all the rest and residue of my Estate both
 Real and personal whosoever and wheresoever not hereinbefore
 disposed of I give devise and bequeath the same unto my wife the
 said Mary Pountney for her own use and benefit I nominate constitute
 and appoint Charles Pountney of Castryham aforesaid Chancellor and
 Executor of this my will and declare that his receipts and acquitances
 shall be good discharge for all monies paid to him under this my will and lastly
 hereby revoking and annulling void all other wills and testaments
 any time heretofore made I do declare this will to be my last will and
 Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this fourth
 day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
 and fifty — Nancy Bacon — signed sealed published and
 acknowledged by the said Elizabeth Newman Widow as and for her last will
 and Testament in the presence of us present at the same time who in the
 presence at her request and in the presence of each other have hereunto
 set our names as witnesses, Joseph Sewell Clerk of the Peace
 for the County of Worcester — John Walker — Thomas White.

This is the last Will and Testament

of me Ann Broadhurst the wife of Alfred Broadhurst of Rodbury in
 the County of Worcester in the parish of St. Mary in the County of Middlesex
 formerly in the service of the honorable the East India Company and
 published this fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and
 forty four calendar months and by virtue of the will of my late husband
 John Miller of an executor by my last will and Testament in writing
 direct or appoint give and bequeath unto such person and persons in such
 parts shares and proportions as I should see fit the principal or capital
 of the sum of one thousand pounds Bank New four per Cent Annuities
 in the same will mentioned and wheresoever such sum is more the sum
 of one thousand pounds three pounds ten per Cent Annuities and is
 standing in the names of the Trustees appointed by or in pursuance of
 the said will Now therefore I the said Ann Broadhurst by virtue and
 in pursuance of the power in such will contained do hereby direct
 appoint give and bequeath the said sum of one thousand pounds in
 three pounds per Cent Annuities and all and every other sum and
 sum of such value I have power to dispose by the said will or otherwise
 unto my dear husband the said Alfred Broadhurst and to my nephew
 Walter Brooks the Younger in Trust for my dear children Alfred
 William Broadhurst, Mary Ann Broadhurst, Dorcas Miller Broadhurst
 and George Craigston Broadhurst equally to be divided between them

share and share alike to and for their several and respective absolute use and benefit to be payable to such children respectively when and as they shall severally attain the respective ages of twenty one years with the accretions arising from the dividends of their respective shares during their respective minorities and in case any one or more of such children shall die under the said age of twenty one years then in Trust for and to bequeath the share and shares of such one or more of them as shall so die to the survivors or survivor of them who shall attain the said age of twenty one years I appoint my said dear beloved and my said dearest Executors of this my will in Trust as aforesaid I revoke all Wills by me heretofore made and revised this to be my last in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand the day and year first above written. *In Broadhurst* signed published and sealed by the said *John Broadhurst* the Testator as and for his last Will and Testament in the presence of us present at the same time who at his request in his presence and in the presence of each other have subscribed our names as witnesses hereto. *F. PROVED at London the 24th Oct: 1851 before the worshipful William an Underley Currier Doctor of Laws and Chancellor by the oath of Alfred Broadhurst the executor one of the Executors to whom administration was granted limited so far only as concerns all the right title and interest of late the said deceased in and to all such personal Estate and Effects as the said deceased by virtue of the will of late the said John Broadhurst deceased being proved in this Court the 6th Dec: 1824 had a right to appoint or dispose of and hath in and by the said Will appointed or disposed of accordingly but no part thereof or otherwise having been first shown duly to administer. Power is reserved of making the life grant to Walter George Brooks in the will written Walter Brooks the younger the devisor the other executor whom he shall apply for the same.

This is the last Will and Testament
 of me *John Bolton* late of *St. James Place* *St. James Square* in the County of *Middlesex* but now of *Chancery Street* in the same County Esquire I give my gold watch made by *W. & A. G. & Co.* and the seal and keys thereto appertaining unto my friend *Isaac Elliott* of *St. James Place* *West Street* *St. Pauls* in the said County of *Middlesex* Esquire and I also give unto him the sum of two hundred pounds for his own use and benefit and I give the sum of one thousand pounds unto each of my two daughters *Fanny Cooper* and *Laura Cooper* now residing at *Cambridge Wells* in the County of *Hertfordshire* for their own benefit respectively and in case either of them should die under the age of twenty one years then I give and bequeath the legacy of the said being unto the survivor or a child of them for their own absolute benefit and I give and bequeath all my money securities for money monies in the public stocks or funds of Great Britain debts and all other my personal Estate whatsoever and wheresoever of or to which I shall be possessed or entitled at the time of my decease and not heretofore by me otherwise disposed of unto the said *Isaac Elliott* his executors administrators and assigns upon Trust with all convenient speed after my decease to sell and convert into money all such parts as he or they shall think proper of my said general personal Estate which shall not consist of money and upon Trust by and out of my said general personal Estate and the monies forthcoming past thereof and to arise thenceby to pay and satisfy all my just debts and my funeral and testamentary expenses and the legacies heretofore given and I do hereby declare that the said *Isaac Elliott* his executors and assigns
